GARDENING Notes by Roger Haines

The Poinsettia - Love It Or Hate It!

No-one can fail to notice that Christmas is nearly upon us as every Garden Centre now has a sea of red poinsettias, a much loved (or for some) much hated Christmas plant. The poinsettia was first discovered in 1828 by Joes Roberts Poinsett, the first US ambassador to Mexico who found it growing by the roadside. He sent some cuttings to his home in North America and since then, its popularity has grown, to the point where, in America, a National Poinsettia Day is celebrated on December 12th.

The actual flower of the plant is small and yellow and is at the centre of the red bracks. When choosing a poinsettia, pick one where the tiny yellow centre flower is still in bud and with none of the red bracks damaged. The plant by nature is brittle and branches will break off to weep a white milky sap that can cause skin irritation but is not poisonous. Leaves should always be of a dark healthy green appearance and plants with yellowing leaves may have been either over-watered or previously exposed to cold. The poinsettia always needs to be kept in a warm bright room out of drafts and the compost kept slightly moist. Because of the susceptibility to extremes of temperature, never be tempted to buy a plant that has been offered for sale in an open air environment where it may have caught a chill!

Amongst those poinsettias offered for sale these days, there are now colour variations including cream, burgundy and pink as well as marbled and spotted plants. Amongst all these, it is the deep red poinsettia that is regarded as the Christmas Flower and is also is know as 'The Flower of the Holy Night'.

Spaldwick Community Primary School Gold Sing Up Award winners.



Spaldwick Community Primary School have just been awarded the first "Sing Up" award in the whole country.

Sing Up was founded one year ago as a national initiative to get all primary school children singing regularly. The Sing Up site provides valuable resources such as song lyrics and backing tracks, as well as running the award scheme. Schools can apply online for silver or gold level awards by filling in a pledge form, making an action plan and then providing evidence such as photos and sound files to show how the plan has succeeded. Spaldwick have not only been awarded the first gold, but they are the ONLY award winners so far!

Spaldwick have been busy making sure they qualified for gold by setting up the Sound Squad (pupils who volunteered to initiate and monitor singing within classrooms), holding weekly Sound Sessions where children can record their own song compositions, and ensuring every class sings every day by using their Sound Box of fun songs. All the teachers have taken up the challenge to lead singing within their classrooms and in assemblies, and even the parents have got involved by joining in with audience participation numbers. Kirsty Body (music co-ordinator) now hopes to reach Platinum soon, which requires the school to be nominated for its achievements. Everyone is thrilled to get the Gold award particularly as it is for something which the whole school enjoys.
