Two years ago Rosemary Good, Ivy House, gave me a bucket full of small frogs; I put them in my pond and within a few days they had all disappeared. Last year, however, I had a pond full of wriggling tadpoles, but they too disappeared within days of turning into frogs.

This year no tadpoles at all, neither in my pond nor in Rosemary's, they obviously all went to Easton.

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The Easton Brook has been full of interest this year; clumps of frog spawn were spotted in March and it is now teeming with well grown tadpoles between Brook House and the road culvert. These have attracted the attention of a shoal of about five small pike, six to ten inches in length, seen during Easter week! They must have swum up when the brook was full during the winter for it has been almost dry downstream of Crown Cottage recently. There has also been a Little Egret in the brook, perhaps gorging on tadpoles (or pike), and a Mallard with a nest of eleven eggs on the edge of the brook opposite the church. At the other end of the village, a swarm of bees tried to set up house, using holes in the brickwork. It couldn't be wasps at this time of year as only queen wasps survive the winter, and it takes some months for them to produce large numbers of workers which then build their papier-mâché combs, underground or in a hollow tree. In the autumn one may frequently get large buzzing 'drone flies' in the house. These are just large hoverflies and are quite harmless. I just catch them and put them outside. Bees and wasps are easily distinguished by having long antennae while most flies have very short ones - and only one pair of wings. What has fifteen pairs of wings? Answer: a family party of Long-tailed tits passing through our garden this week. Eight to twelve per nest is normal, but can all these have come from one nest? Crown Cottage had one nest and there was another in the hedge in Broadweir so perhaps this was a double family. Finally, I must mention the impressive series of Dryad's saddle bracket fungi growing on an elm stump in Chapel Lane.

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## No Gardening Notes from the expert, Roger

Haines, this month, so with the space to fill, here are some notes from an amateur. John Blatch

## Gardening with Wildlife

Rabbits are the gardeners' big enemy. They can be kept out by a constantly repaired wire netting fence or they can be shot, trapped, poisoned or given some revolting disease. I cannot keep them out of my garden because they are resident in it, and I will not see them killed, so I must live with them.

They do perform a useful function, they keep the grass short, in fact I have mowed just twice so far this year. Unfortunately the rabbits do not nibble in regular stripes so I do not have a lawn but a grass patch that is slowly turning into rough pasture, For about a day or so after mowing it looks presentable.

The rabbits are, partial to flowers. Petunias are their favourites, so I have planted these only in the troughs around the conservatory. I thought that they would not attack them but then I saw a rabbit eying a trough and I banged on the window just as he was up on his hind legs with his mouth open, so I have had to put netting over the troughs.

I also persuaded myself for several weeks that they did not like lobelia, which I had planted in unprotected beds as well as boxes. Then I realised that those in the boxes were about three times the size of the others and, on closer inspection, could see that they had sneakily nibbled the tips leaving most of the foliage so that one had to look closely to see the damage. So the beds too are now netted, initially with plastic netting, which they promptly chewed through, and now with wire and boards. It is beginning to look a bit like an inner city allotment, but the defences are easily removed for visitors or parties.

Muntjacs have been resident in the past although not at the moment, but they do make occasional visits. They like roses and water lilies, both of which are only just coming into flower. It remains to be seen whether they will have the initiative to get over the 40cm high rabbit fence around the roses. They cannot do too much damage to the lilies, they just take bites out the flowers and leaves that can be reached from the edges of the ponds.

Squirrels do not do much damage, except when they bury nuts and are careless about what they are digging up, such as bedding plants. Birds do surprising damage to the 'lawn'. I have left the bird feeder in one position for too long and, with their tiny beaks, they have dug sizeable holes around the base in the search for fallen seeds. I moved the feeder and put bits of turf in the holes, which the blackbirds promptly pulled up to search for grubs, so I had to net there as well.

## Recent Incidents in our area

STOW LONGA - Theft of a Motor vehicle, this has been found burnt out in Northamptonshire.

There have been a number of burglaries to homes and garages. Be vigilant and ensure that you have **locked** and secured your homes and outbuildings. If you are in the garden and you have been in the garage don't leave it open, if you can't see it lock it as this could be the chance for a potential thief to strike.

There has been an incident in Sawtry where a victim had arranged to have some maintenance work done to her home; an amount of money was agreed however, the victim was asked for more money than the amount originally agreed. Report any incidents like this with as much information as you can such as descriptions and registration numbers of vehicles.

Theft of motorcycles in Huntingdonshire - Since the middle of April 2009, Cambridgeshire Constabulary has received reports of 9 actual or attempt thefts of motorcycles from predominantly residential addresses, across Huntingdonshire. In most cases, the motorcycles have had some form of lock fitted, however they appear to have been simply lifted on to waiting vehicles. Most of the thefts have occurred from the front of the victim's properties where the motorcycles have been in full view of passers by.

There are some security measures that can be taken to limit the opportunities for further thefts, therefore if you own a motorcycle or know someone else that does, please suggest that they consider security/crime prevention advice.
