

What a long winter it has been! But at last - Look at the grass, sucked by the seed from dust,/ Whose blood is the spring rain, whose food the sun/.... The first symbol of Spring for me was a Brimstone butterfly on 16th March, on ex-

actly the same date as last year! Followed immediately by the big, buff-tailed terrestris bumblebee and the pink-tailed pratorum bumblebee, which is a particularly important pollinator for soft fruit. And then, on the 21st, I spotted a large clump of frogspawn in the Easton Brook, some thirty yards downstream from the footbridge where it was last year. There seem to be several clusters together and a couple slightly apart. Female frogs like to combine their efforts and this mass is clearly the product of several frogs. Frogs spawn in shallow, often temporary pools such as water-filled wheel ruts, to avoid predation by fish, so garden ponds with goldfish wont do. They don't usually use running water but the Brook is so shallow and by June usually ceases to flow altogether. Tadpoles here run the risk either of being swept away in a sudden downpour, or dying from drought before their legs have grown and they are ready to hop out. But it only needs three or four frogs to survive to maturity from this mass of spawn to keep the wheels of life turning. And they have managed to do this for millions of years, so the gamble must work.

The Committee spent the early part of January familiarising themselves with the current state of affairs and planning how to move forward. It qualifies as the best candidate for many reasons: The first is that it is owned by the Parish Council, they have been very positive about our project and we hope that they will be willing to allow the land to be developed.
