DID YOU KNOW?

TEN INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT SPALDWICK By Martina Townsend (with thanks to Rosemary Good)

- 1. The name Spaldwick is probably derived from the Saxon term for "the dairy farm by the rushing stream".
- 2. People have been living in Spaldwick since the 9th Century!
- 3. The spire of St James' Church was struck by lightning one hundred and four years ago on 30^{th} May 1904, causing severe damage the bells were out of action until 1921!
- 4. There are six bells in our church each with its own inscription; one of which reads "God Save the King 1635".
- 5. The Spaldwick Bridge on the Thrapston Road probably dates back to $15^{\rm th}$ Century.
- 6. The village green was originally a place to hold fairs and markets, in addition to being a place for games and relaxation.
- 7. During renovations at the George Pub some time ago, three frescoes dating back 400 years were found, one of which depicted an archer with a bow and arrow.
- 8. The Manor House is the oldest of the listed buildings in the village, dating back to 1520.
- 9. In addition to the George, there was another coaching inn on the Thrapston Road, on a site now occupied by farm buildings.
- 10. Spaldwick used to have its own doctors' surgery, located in one of the old cottages (now demolished) on Thrapston Road.

LOCAL PEOPLE

Sylvia Black - My Memories of Spaldwick

I remember being evacuated here at the tender age of five, back in September of 1940. I came here from Acton, along with my older brother, while my father fought in the War. I can remember arriving at Huntingdon Station in my navy blue coat, with my little name tag and my gas mask, and then being taken to The Gables where my new guardian Winnie Woodham (Auntie Winn) worked. I then remember standing in front of the pantry door, reaching for the latch, because I wanted to try and get home; I missed my mum and dad of course. But after a while I settled in very well; I had a lovely family and I was spoiled rotten - with books and all kinds of things.

My brother wasn't quite so lucky and he didn't enjoy his stay so much. In fact, he ran away two or three times, walked all the way to Huntingdon, and managed to sneak on to the train and hide all the way until he got back to London.

As you can imagine, life in Spaldwick was very different; for a start there was no cinema here. I'd also been used to gas lights in London and we had only candles here and the toilet was outside! But I discovered other wonders, including how to milk cows, make tents and play in the fields, the fair and fetes at the old School in Berry Close, with swing boats and roundabouts. I also used to enjoy the dances in the Victory Hall, which used to be located on

the corner of Royston Avenue.

I was often sent to stand behind the blackboard at school, for passing notes, scraping chairs, or some other stuff. I felt a little bit singled-out at times as I was called "That Evacuee", but it didn't bother me too much, and I carried on regardless - this was home to me. The American soldiers stationed nearby were also very kind to us, with plenty of sweets and hot chocolate brought to us at the School.

I went back to Acton after the war, but came back to Spaldwick by the time of my next Summer Holiday, then ended up staying for good! Eventually I married a chap from the RAF at nearby Brampton and we had a daughter here. Auntie Winn moved in with us and stayed until she died in 1994.

I've seen many changes in the village, many houses have been built and many of the old shops have slowly disappeared: there was the sweetie shop, the cobblers, baby shop, blacksmiths, two grocery shops, the old Post Office and the café have all gone.

One thing I do miss is the old and young people getting together; I think the last good "mix up" we had was the Silver Jubilee in '77.
