CHURCH ROOF

The church roof has now been repaired after the theft of the lead last year. We have been informed by the insurance company that, in future, they will pay a maximum of £5,000 towards the replacement of stolen lead roofing (the recent replacement cost £15,000) unless we install a movement detector connected to an automatic telephone dialler. This will cost about £4,000 and the church simply does not have the money for it. There is a movement activated floodlight mounted on the spire, pointing at the roof. Due to the daylight cut-out this will not normally operate whilst the tower floodlighting is on but, if it is seen after midnight, this may be evidence of somebody on the roof. If anyone sees this please telephone John Blatch, 890853 or, if actual movement is seen, dial 999 and inform the police. The roof has been painted with SmartWater to aid identification should the lead be stolen again. Also, Paul and Kim Hall, who live in Church Lane, will be parking their cars to stop vehicle access to the church path. This will normally only be at night; if they happen to be there during the day they will be happy to move them if access is needed

HARVEST IN & TIDY UP

Here we are in September and another year has not so much slipped by but galloped, and those winter catalogues are popping through the door. This year I planted up containers with summer flowering bulbs to fill in the spaces in the border where there was little colour or where plants had underperformed, and found this to be a successful way of plugging the gaps. I am going to plant up plenty of pots with daffodils and tulips for the same effect next spring. By the way, don't believe all you read in those glossy catalogues about new varieties, as one is plugging a 'new' *plumosum muscari - feather hyacinth* which I have found in Telkamps catalogue for 1937!! (Yes that's what I spend my lonely evenings doing)!

Now is the time for one more good blitz on lawns. I am going to scarify my lawn before the end of the month and give it a good dressing of autumn weed and feed. Although the summer has been quite damp I have not had a build up of moss and therefore I am mainly getting out the thatch. My back lawn is never treated with any sort of weed killer as our friends' dogs who visit for their holidays like to sunbathe. As a result, I have a few patches of daisies which have replaced the grass, so I shall dig these out and re-seed shortly as the nights are starting to become damp. This is also a good time to cast a few grass seeds over any bare patches.

I have also let my sweet peas go to seed and will be harvesting these as soon as the pods have turned brown, at which point they will be dried, taken out of the husks and stored in brown paper bags ready for next spring. Looking round the borders, now is the time to save those seedlings that nature has given us around mature plants by transferring them to pots or a nursery bed to use next year or give away to friends. This summer has mainly benefited our fruit crops with apples, pears and plums being plentiful and we have made some very nice Victoria Plum Jam and have also enjoyed some delicious crumbles.

Spaldwick Allotments Project: I hope to have some news next month about the allotments. Things are progressing regarding a site and I have a meeting with Anglian Water concerning a water supply and this is looking quite promising. More news next month.

Music News

Instrumental pupils at Spaldwick have been busy taking grade exams this summer on flute, clarinet, piano, saxophone, descant recorder and guitar. In all twenty pupils took exams ranging from preparatory test to grade 4, and all passed with flying colours. This is particularly impressive considering that the vast majority of pupils have been playing their instrument for less than a year. There were 8 prep tests, 9 grade 1s, one grade 2, one grade 4 and a guitar debut grade. This is addition to several piano prep tests earlier in the year. One pupil managed to take grade 4 saxophone having only started in September, along with grade 4 treble recorder and grade 1 piano outside school, and all at the tender age of just 9! Spaldwick continues to raise standards in music through instrumental lessons, specialist class music lessons and a full wider opportunities programme enabling each year group to learn an instrument for a year such as ocarina, tin whistle, keyboard, samba and African drumming.

This year we hope to be successful in achieving a gold Sing Up award which is part of the national initiative to get primary schools singing. The new Spaldwick Sound Squad is a team of children who will help to lead singing throughout the school within class time and on the playground in order to fulfil the criteria for the gold award. Enthusiasm for singing is clearly high with over seventy percent of the school applying for a place on the squad!

Thanks to a major fundraising by FOSS [Friends of Spaldwick School], we have also been able to purchase two new pianos for the school. FOSS received donations from pupils, families, our school catchment villages, many local businesses and beyond!! We look forward to the arrival of the pianos and the continued enjoyment of music at Spaldwick School.
