## NATURE NOTES by Brian Davis

How many of you, I wonder, did your Big Garden Bird Watch last weekend for the RSPB? My neighbours 'bagged' the roving Long-tailed tit family that sometimes comes to our nuts but I still managed nine 'regular' species. Jays, which are normally very shy woodland birds, have been seen in several gardens recently, and there was a wonderful view of a perched sparrow hawk, but these rare visitors never choose the Big Day. Having not seen a single Hedgehog last year I phoned around and was relieved to hear that they had been seen by others. This winter should be a good one for hibernating. The results of the UK Countryside Survey for 2007 are now out and comparisons can be made with the earlier surveys made in 1978, 1984, 1990 and 1998. In 2007, the survey teams from Monks Wood and Lancaster collected data from 591 squares of 1km in GB statistically distributed so as to cover all habitat types and draw reliable conclusions about change. For example, some of the largest changes between 1990 and 2007 were in hedgerows and other linear features (down 14.6%) and chalk and limestone grassland (down 27.2%). Between 1978 and 2007, there have been significant declines in total number of plant species, number of bird food species and number of butterfly food species, but since 1998 all three of these indicators have shown an upward trend in eastern England.

## PARISH COUNCIL

At the meeting on 15<sup>th</sup> January, attended by all 6 councillors and 8 members of the public, Graham Smith of Spen House, 3 Stow Road was co-opted to the council to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Jim Shears. No other candidate put their name forward.

Amongst other matters, it was noted that the new street light in Church Lane, funded by the Parish Council, with a grant of 54% of the cost from the District Council, had become operational in December.

The lowest of three quotes for removal of the old bus shelter base and restoration of the area to grass was accepted.

It was decided to send the results of the recent traffic survey to the local MP, Chief Constable, District and County Councils and the Highways Agency with a view to obtaining their help in introducing measures to reduce the risk of accidents arising from excessive speed. A summary of the results will also be made available to members of the public.

Two planning applications were reconsidered: - one dwelling on land at 11 Stow Road, and four dwellings on land adjacent to 33 Thrapston Road.

The next Council meeting open to the public will be on 15<sup>th</sup> January at 8.00pm in the School.

## GARDEN NOTES

Spring's Around The Corner.

Spring must be nearly here as the snowdrops are opening and the length of daylight is growing. We have now had a few frost free days so plants will be beginning to stir and by the end of the month, tree and shrub pruning should have been completed. If your beds and borders are dry enough to work on, then clear away dead leaves and cut back perennials and split any congested clumps. (If you have any over, please pot them up for the Plant Stall that will be part of this year's Village Fete.) Now is also the time to tidy up your Helleborus Hybridus by cutting last year's leaves to make room for the new ones and emerging flowers.

Under cover, plant peas and broad beans in pots or modules ready to be planted out when the weather improves. If you are growing potatoes, buy them now and chit in a light frost-free cool place in trays (it will take about 6 weeks for the dark green potato shoots to appear). I am growing mine in containers again this year and hope to get a better crop. Before you rush out to buy new packets of vegetable seeds, check what you have left from last year as most of these seeds will be viable for this season. In the fruit garden, plant raspberries, blackcurrants, gooseberries and strawberries as there is a good selection available in most garden centres now.

Don't forget to keep your winter planters watered and keep dead-heading pansies and primulas. The cyclamen in my displays have been hit by the long frosts so these will now be replaced with dwarf daffodils. When your clumps of snowdrops have finished flowering, this is the best time to lift and split them into smaller clumps whilst they still have their green leaves. One of the best snowdrop displays locally can be found at Chelveston. The churchyard is a carpet of white, simply breathtaking!

### Allotments Update

The latest news on this project is that we have now re-submitted our final application for Lottery Funding and should have a decision in the next six weeks, so here hoping!

### Governor Visit Day

(A truly great and enlightening visit to the school)

On Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> January seven governors joined the children at Spaldwick Primary School to experience a day in the life of a pupil. We had held our first visit day last year and the response from the governors was so positive that we decided to repeat the experience so that new governors and those who had come last time could develop their knowledge of the school. Timetables were created and lunches booked in preparation for the day. Our visitors spent time in classes across the age range and participated in parachute making, practiced key board playing, wrote poetry, honed their knowledge of tens and units, mixed powder paints, learned about digraphs, explored materials used in buildings and investigated mountains among many other varied activities. During lunch, governors commented on the polite behaviour of the children and the "mood lifting" atmosphere.

Several governors were able to spend time in the Life Education Classroom - a county resource used by many primary schools. One governor found that he'd "...learned more about the small intestine in two minutes than in 72 years!" Whilst they worked alongside the children and staff, the governors considered how the school promotes its aims and gathered evidence to support their responses.

The responses from the governors were as positive as last year. They felt that to spend time in school watching the children experience the range of opportunities available gave a real understanding and appreciation of life at Spaldwick School.

It gave them an insight into "...such a vibrant and successful learning establishment, the work, planning and commitment that must exist within the Spaldwick School team is just mind blowing; that this is delivered to such a high standard every day, incredible, that you constantly push to improve is just amazing".
