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Please be aware of recent **Distraction Burglaries** that occurred near Kettering, Peterborough & Great Gidding.

Two dark haired males wearing brown suits have posed as **Police officers** they have entered the property of an elderly victim and stole money.

If you are not expecting anyone to visit your home and some unknown persons do and they say that they are from a company or business, ask them for proof of identity, if they are genuine they will not mind showing you their ID. A genuine person will not mind waiting outside your home if you need to clarify the ID of the caller with the company/business.

If you are in doubt try to gain as much information and/or descriptions as you can and call the police. Please remain vigilant and report anything suspicious to the police.

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#### **PUT YOUR CAR KEYS BESIDE YOUR BED AT NIGHT**

Put your car keys beside your bed at night. If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car battery dies.

This tip came from a neighbourhood watch coordinator. Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of this:

It's a security alarm system that you probably already have and requires no installation. It works if you park in your driveway or garage. If your car alarm goes off when someone is trying to break into your house, odds are the burglar won't stick around... After a few seconds all the neighbours will be looking out their windows to see who is out there - the criminal won't want that. Remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a car park. The alarm can work the same way there. This is something that should really be shared with everyone. Maybe it could save a life or another crime.

# NATURE NOTES by Brian Davis

*If winter comes can spring be far behind?* We haven't had a good old-fashioned winter like this for many years, but the 1962/3 winter was far worse and there must some in Easton and Spaldwick who were here through the 1947 winter and could share a memory or two. Aconites were already yellowing the ground in our garden before the snow, waiting for a brave bumblebee, and I guess that frogs and toads are waiting impatiently to gather at their nuptial ponds. I recently found a list I made in 1968 of the fields in Easton that used to have ponds: a few fields had two making a total of 94 ponds in 89 fields. These must all have been for livestock and it is strange how these records on old maps preserve echoes of the numerous cattle and sheep that must once have formed a dominant part of village life. A map I made in 1968 also shows 14 meadows in Easton parish with ridge-and-furrow, preserving echoes of even more ancient ploughing techniques with horses or oxen. Of these only five, I think, still survive. The Countryside Survey I mentioned last month estimates that there are now only about half a million ponds in Britain (excluding those in gardens) and there is a drive to double this number. A Roe deer has recently been doing the rounds and has seen in Easton. They reach 25 inches at the shoulder and stand more erect than Muntjac which reaches 19 inches and has the distinctive hump back with sloping rump.

### So Much For Global Warming!

Well, the snow and prolonged frosts have come and gone and let's hope they don't return, although they will have been very beneficial in thinning out the bug population.

If you have any last minute pruning to do, get on with it now as the sap is rising. Hybrid T and floribunda roses will benefit from a good prune to an outward facing bud. A tidy up of climbing and rambling roses should be kept to a minimum but tie in any long growth.

We seem to be into a relatively dry spell so get borders weeded, perennials tidied and any overgrown clumps divided. Now is a good time to split ornamental grasses that are overgrown and also give a 'haircut' before the new shoots appear. There are plenty of potted bulbs in the garden centres for brightening up pot displays or bare patches in the border.

Now is a good time to start your dahlia tubers into growth in the greenhouse or conservatory so they are well advanced to plant out after the frosts and when they have been hardened off. Lily bulbs are always good grown in pots and then placed to brighten up or fill any gaps in the border. Increase watering of over-wintered fuchsias, give them a good tidy up and keep a keen eye out for blight.

This month, the grass will begin to grow so now is the time to attack moss with lawn sand (containing iron sulphate) followed up with a good rake after it turns black. Give your lawn its first couple of cuts on a high blade setting and then gradually lower your blades on subsequent cuts. If you have any bald or thin patches of grass, now is a good time to sow these areas with some seed.

Summer bedding is already appearing for sale but don't be tempted to start off those baskets and containers unless you have a heated greenhouse as the plants will only sulker at low temperatures.

### Y3 Kingfisher Class Viking Day



The day was brought to life by having Cathy Murphy who is a member of a living history group. Cathy brought many Viking artefacts. We also looked at clothes and types of food that Vikings would have eaten. We learnt all about Viking ruin stones and how they celebrated the memories of special Vikings and their brave deeds.

Each child had their own authentic Viking name for the day and came to school in Viking dress. For homework the children had made their own shield, helmet and sword and brought them into school in preparation for our battle re-enactment.

The highlight of the day began with looking at replicas of Viking weapons and taking part in weapon training (using our homemade weapons). Cathy demonstrated how to hold a spear in one hand and a shield in the other. We practised our moves and then headed out the playground where we learnt about The Battle of Hastings, pretending to be Normans and Saxons. We re-enacted the battle including staves, cheers and sword waving. But, as in 1066 the Saxons yet again were defeated by Normans.
