There is still a steady stream of pedal cycles being stolen in Huntingdon, both in the town and in the residential areas. Many of the bikes are being stolen from people's gardens. In most cases the stolen bikes have been left unlocked. When these crimes are being reported the owners of the bikes are not able to offer good descriptions of the bikes. If we find someone on a suspected stolen bike it is very hard for us to bring offenders to justice unless we can prove the bike is stolen

We need your help to reduce this type of crime so please:

- ♦ Always lock your bike with a good quality lock even if left for a short time to something immoveable
- ♦ Lock your bike even if it is in your garden
- ♦ Take a photo of your bike and record the frame number (usually this is stamped underneath the frame) and a description of the bike.
- ♦ Remember the more details we get the more chance you have of getting the bike back and an offender being brought to justice.
- ♦ Finally It is your bike, please take responsibility for making it hard for the thieves to steal your property.

Progress with superfast broadband in Spaldwick

Thank you to everyone who has supported, and signed up to, the Connecting Cambridgeshire campaign. The 219 registrations (representing over 84% of premises) firmly place Spaldwick in the top three of Cambridgeshire parishes.

If you have not already registered, or if you have a second line in your house, it is not too late to register at www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk.

Currently, the formal procurement process is underway, with a decision expected from Cambridgeshire County Council in **December 2012**.

We can only hope that Spaldwick, which is served by the Woolley exchange, will be included in the superfast broadband plans. Given that the BT street cabinet in Spaldwick is already equipped with an optical fibre connection from the Woolley exchange and we have demonstrated clear demand, we hope that these will be enough to secure superfast broadband for our village.

Mark continues to be in regular discussion with the Connecting Cambridgeshire project team as well as many Broadband Champions across the county. Save The Children - Then and Now

As we are shortly to have a fund raising event on behalf of Save The Children, I thought I'd have a look at the history of the charity and find out what projects they are currently involved in.

I didn't even know that the charity was founded by an Englishwoman, Eglantyne Jebb, (now there's a name to conjure with) as a result of hearing about the plight of children who were on the losing side after the First World War.

After the war ended, the British government kept up a blockade that left children in cities like Berlin and Vienna starving. Tuberculosis and rickets were rife. Amazingly, Eglantyne was arrested in Trafalgar Square and fined for distributing leaflets highlighting the plight of these children. How times have changed! Eglantyne and her sister Dorothy Buxton decided that direct action was needed as well as campaigning, so The Save the Children Fund was set up at a public meeting in London's Royal Albert Hall in May 1919.

During the decades that have followed, the charity has helped children, initially in the UK and Europe (notably during the Second World War), but then latterly in Africa and Asia who, due to famine, corruption, religious intolerance, war or political recklessness have suffered terrible deprivation.

To add further 'clout' to their efforts, Princess Anne became president of the organisation in 1970 and the first national Save the Children Week was held in 1974.

In 1984 the famine in Ethiopia was headline news. TV coverage of this and other disasters caught public attention. Donations to Save the Children increased and they were able to work more widely around the world. But the news coverage had a damaging effect as well. It perpetuated negative stereotypes of people in developing countries, who were seen as dependent and helpless. This has led in recent years to instances of 'compassion fatigue' where (usually) generous people have felt that perhaps their money isn't doing the good they hoped it would. But better publicity and communication of what terrific work is being carried out by Save The Children during the 1990s and up to the present day has meant the charity has been able to continue to work with deprived children, notably in Iraq, Sudan, Somalia, Mozambique, Nicaragua, Colombia, Sierra Leone, Angola and the Balkans. As recently as last month, the charity launched a new appeal for funds to help children in Syria who have escaped to Jordan and Lebanon, many of them young and unaccompanied - a situation that we cannot begin to imagine.

We do hope you will come and support our small effort to raise funds for Save The Children by attending our Coffee Morning and Christmas Card sale at the home of Maggie Lincoln, 39 High Street, Spaldwick on Tuesday 6th November from 10am to 1pm.
