The dark evenings can provide perfect cover for a sneak-in burglar who spots an open window in an unoccupied room; sees your valuables through open curtains or blinds; or tries their luck with an unlocked door.

The noise and distraction of <u>bonfire celebrations</u> also present an ideal opportunity for thieves to break into homes and each year we remind people to make their home secure and put lights on before heading out - even if they are only holding a display in their own rear garden.

Some simple tips to reduce your home becoming a target -

- \* Always lock your doors and accessible windows
- \* Use a timer switch to turn lights and radios on to give the impression that some is home
- \* Close curtains or blinds after dark so that your valuables cannot be seen from outside
- \* Install a burglar alarm and set up before leaving the house

\* Register your valuables for free on the national property register <u>www.immobilise.com</u> so that if your property is lost or stolen and recovered by Police you are more likely to get it back.



## CHURCH ROOF

We have finally raised the £25000 required to repair the church roof. The money has come from insurance £5000, own fund-raising £5000, a loan from the Cambridge Historic Churches Trust £3000 and a grant from Amey CESPA, the local landfill operator, of £12000. We have protected bats in the roof (not in the belfry), pippistrelle and long-eared, and unless we can prove that they are no longer resi-

dent, we cannot start work until April 2014. We have only now been told that an inspection will cost an un-budgeted  $\pm 500$ .

The original estimate for the work has been held for 2 years now, whether it will hold for another 6 months until April is being investigated by the church architect.

The replacement material will be "Terne coated stainless steel". This resembles lead but potential thieves will find that, unlike lead, there is no market for stolen panels.



It's hard to believe the first half-term is already over this autumn, but we've got lots more fun planned at youth group after the week's holiday.

#### Local residents reminded to Choose Well this winter

Residents in Huntingdonshire are being reminded to find the right health service for their illness or injury this winter.

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) who commission health services in the area are asking local residents to familiarise themselves with the range of local health services and which illnesses and injuries they can treat. Last year it cost the local NHS  $\pounds$ 2million treating people in A&E when they could have used a different service. This could have treated 500 heart attack patients or bought 250 hip replacements.

Here's a reminder of what local NHS services can treat.

• Pharmacies can help with bugs and viruses, skin conditions, allergies, and help with stopping smoking.

• GPs can help with back ache, ear aches, painful coughs, mental health conditions and any illness or injury that won't go away. There's also an out of hours GP service which can be accessed by calling your usual GP practice number and following the instructions.

• The Walk-in Centre in St Neots at 24 Moore's *Walk* can help with minor burns and scalds, bites and stings and strains and sprains.

Or you can look after colds, coughs, sore throats, hangovers, stomach upsets, grazes can all be treated at home with a well-stocked medicine cabinet.

Dr David Irwin GP from Hunts Care Partners Local Commissioning Group, who lives in Spaldwick, said, "Winter brings more coughs, colds and flu so it is a good idea to be prepared and to make sure you have a supply of remedies at home to help care for you and your family over the holiday period. If you need a regular prescription for a long term condition, please check now to make sure that you have enough to last you over the holiday season, and go to your GP or pharmacist to collect any prescriptions in good time before the holidays."
