<u>Action Fraud</u> is the UK's national reporting centre for fraud and Internet crime where you should report fraud if you have been scammed, defrauded or experienced cyber crime. They provide a central point of contact for information about fraud and financially motivated internet crime.

People are scammed, ripped off or conned everyday, it is the biggest growth crime and we know that our members find the variety of different warnings (that are sometimes out of date) confusing, we also know that it is not always clear where to report potential scams or check if something is a scam. The service is run by the City of London Police working alongside the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau - responsible for assessment of the reports and to ensure that your fraud reports reach the right place. The City of London Police is the national policing lead for economic crime.

## WIND FARM GRANTS

(Administered by Cambridgeshire Community Foundation) As some recompense for the appearance of the Wind Farm on Woolley Hill a Community Fund has been established and Groups are now invited to apply for grants from this fund. Details are as follows.

Applications for funding are invited by constituted groups (not individuals) delivering charitable projects with public benefit for Spaldwick, Alconbury, Barham, Woolley, Buckworth, Easton, Ellington,

Organisations must have three or more independent people on their management committee, an up to date Equal Opportunity Policy, a bank account with two or more independent signatures and a Safeguarding Policy if working with either children and/or vulnerable adults. If the group is a registered charity its submissions to the Charity Commission must be up-to-date.

Grants will be offered normally in the range of £250 to £5,000, although in exceptional circumstances higher sums may be considered.

Grants will not be made retrospectively. Funding will not be provided to support projects promoting political or religious views, for sponsored events or to cover expenditure considered to be a statutory responsibility. Grants will not normally be given to projects primarily concerned with animal welfare, medical research and equipment, or overseas travel.

To be considered at the first panel meeting in April 2015, applications and supporting information must be submitted by 31 March 2015 at the latest.

This has been an exceptional year with the finances distorted by the final receipt and expenditure of funds for the replacement of the church roof. The greater part of the money, £16350, came from the Landfill Tax Credit Scheme which makes funds available to communities within 10 miles of a landfill site, in our case Buckden. £3000 was given by the Historic Churches Trust, £5000 from insurance whilst £3400 came from our own fund raising.

It takes nearly £10000 just to keep the church going for one year, so we cannot rest and are having our first fund-raising

- Walk-in centre or minor illness or injury unit these can help with minor burns and scalds, bites and stings, strains and sprains and minor eye or ear problems.• If you don't know which service you need to choose, dial NHS 111 and they will help. You can call NHS 111 free from any phone 24/7. Call 111 when it's less urgent than 999.

Dr Emma Tiffin, Cambridge GP said, "Local patients are encouraged to Choose Well when they are ill or injured to ensure the right treatment can be given quicker to those in need of urgent care.

Dr Tiffin added "Winter always brings more coughs, colds and flu so it's a good idea to be prepared and to make sure you have a supply of remedies at home to help care for you and your family over the colder months."
