Regulars bid farewell to Steve and Allister from The George


After 10 years of running The George, Spaldwick residents have bid farewell to Steve and Allister who have moved on to pastures new.

Spaldwick Neighbourhood Watch - by coordinator David Henrick

David Henrick is coordinator of Spaldwick Neighbourhood watch. In each edition of Spaldwick News, David updates us with the latest information and warnings issued by the organisation.

Vulnerable man gave thousands to fraudster he thought loved him

Like many people struggling with loneliness after the breakdown of a relationship, a retired dentist turned to the internet looking for company, friendship and possibly love. Sadly, it didn't work out as he'd hoped. Simon, who is in his late 70s, speaks openly about the heartbreak of falling victim to a romance scam.

Simon explains how meeting a woman online turned from a dream into a nightmare. He said: "I'd been living in Spain for 30 years when I returned to the UK, leaving my wife and life behind.

I started chatting to people online and it developed from there. I just wanted someone I could chat to on a one -to-one basis and be friendly with. I chatted to one woman almost daily and it developed very quickly into showing interest in each other, having conversations about family life etc. She started asking me for money for a whole host of reasons. I first sent money over for her mother who she said was unwell, which I later discovered obviously wasn't true."

To date, Simon has transferred more than £30,000 to different people he met on-line, who he now knows weren't who they said they were. Some of the key red flags to be aware when speaking to someone online include:

- Asking you to move onto another platform: Fraudsters often try to move victims onto other platforms and sites to chat, away from the
 protection and monitoring of a
 professional dating site.
- When asking you for money, fraudsters will often concoct elaborate or emotive stories, either about an illness, a crisis or perhaps for a business venture or travel costs to come and see you.
- A reluctance to meet: Fraudsters often show a reluctance to meet up in person or will let you down at the last minute giving an excuse as to why they couldn't make it.

Reporting a crime:

- If it's an emergency and the crime is still taking place, call 999 and ask for the police.
- If it's not an emergency, do not call 999. This doesn't mean the crime is not important – it just helps the police to make the best use of their resources. Many police forces use the 101 non-emergency number.
- If you have information regarding a crime and don't want to talk to the police, contact Crimestoppers online or call 0800 555 111. You will stay anonymous. Always.

Spaldwick Allotment Committee: "Down on the Farm" - by Mark Herriman



At last count, over the last eleven years, we have had five different allotments in five separate places. The curse of rental properties! However, after making the decision to settle in Spaldwick, we were both surprised and elated when we were offered a plot on the allotments here in the village, a mere 5-minute walk from our front door.

We've maintained these plots over the years with varying levels of productivity and, after harvesting enough potatoes, onions, and garlic to see us though the winter months, we undoubtably end up with piles and piles of courgettes that we cannot get rid of for love nor money, defaulting to the fact that every social occasion will be with a proffered bag of the things on arrival.

This time round we were adamant that planting two seedlings would be sufficient, however, after watching our 4-year-old diligently raise multiple courgette plants from seed in the garden, we are once again the proud owners of twelve courgette plants firmly in the ground on the allotment (pictured left).

When we first took on the plot two months ago we drew up plans and decided to tackle it a little bit at a time then, threw said plans away, and proceeded with reckless abandon to plant whatever we could almost as

soon as the earth had been dug over; alongside collecting any free materials we could lay our hands on to transform it into what we hope will be, in time, our haven of fresh, seasonal, year round produce.

Thanks to the power of social media, and our hope to spend as little money as possible, we have so far procured, free-of-charge, a 25 year old shed, about 80m of old decking boards, more paving slabs than we know what to do with and, to the delight of our daughter, a large, deep sandpit to provide some alternative entertainment to buckets of water (muddy puddles) and trying to re-home every last bug she can find.



Discounting the fact our plot currently looks like a cross between an allotment and a builder's merchant we are already beginning to reap the rewards. We inherited a mature strawberry bed that gave us weeks of the sweetest fruit, most of which did not make it as far as the gate; cucumbers and tomatoes are ripening daily; our beans are in full flower and those courgettes are starting to pile up in the kitchen alongside an ever-growing pile of recipes to try and deal with the glut.



The amount of wildlife in and around the allotments is amazing. All manner of pollinators and butterflies are swarming around our lavender and, subsequently, our fruit and vegetable plants. Later in the evening Muntjac deer are seen exploring the adjoining fields along with hares and an abundance of rabbits.

In fact, recently, the allotments themselves played host to the cast of Watership Down. Thankfully, the holes in the boundary fence were dutifully repaired and the rabbits free to continue with their vegetable eating elsewhere.



The list of jobs continues to grow daily, our three large vegetable beds are laid out, we are creating a new fruit bed and we have committed to an exceptionally large polytunnel that we hope will enable us to continue growing well into the long winter months.

As I write this the temperature is creeping up towards 40 degrees so

watering will have to wait until late in the evening. This is a relativity short and simple job, however, with a group of like-minded, sociable people and a great community feel what starts as a quick 10-minute job often leads to long conversations and the sky darkening over what must be one of the best views we have ever had from an allotment site.
