There has been a small number of burglaries around parts of the rural area. Patrols have been conducted in and around Hammerton/Winwick and the Giddings.

Always keep doors and windows closed and locked or in a ventilated but locked position, even when you are inside the house.

Always check and lock doors with a key - never assume that just pushing up an internal handle will lock the door.

Remove keys from window and door locks, but keep them in a familiar and safe place where all members of the family know where to find them in the event of an emergency.

Never leave items such as keys, bags and money on show through a window, as these can prove a real temptation for an opportunist burglar.

Consider the position of key racks or shelves next to a door and ensure that they cannot be reached through the letter box.

Use timer switches to turn on lights and radios when you are going to be away from your house.

Consider the use of lights at the front and rear of your property that are activated when someone approaches.

LAWN CARE IN FEBRUARY

CHURCH QUIZ NIGHT

The Quiz Night was well attended with 50 people and 11 teams. There was a wide spread of scores, from a possible total of 134 points the best score was 92 and the least 30. The latter team named themselves No Idea and lived up to their name. The Soup and Roll with Coffee and Cakes was voted a very good alternative to the Fish and Chip van used on previous occasions.. £400 was raised for church funds.

Last year a total of £11622 raised. See opposite. Thanks to all those who helped or attended the several fund raising evenings organised by the church committee or by others who wished to help, particularly Roger Haines and the Gardening Club, Stuart Dixon with his church booklets and the many house party hosts. Unfortunately most of the funds were taken up by running costs, £4500 as our share of the Vicar's stipend and expenses and £3063 insurance so our underlying funds increased by just £1834.

This will go towards the cost of re-roofing the church but the bulk of the money will still have to come from English Heritage. Our application last August was turned down but another one will be submitted before the February deadline this year..

Superfast broadband status

In December 2012, the Connecting Cambridgeshire team announced a slight delay in the superfast broadband procurement process. This is because the remaining bidders were given a small extension to mid-December for their bid submissions to ensure the highest quality bids.

The Cambridgeshire superfast broadband procurement process to appoint a supplier to roll out better broadband across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough is on track to conclude in **February 2013**. As the lead authority, Cambridgeshire County Council Cabinet will be asked to approve the contract award to the preferred supplier at its meeting on Monday 4th February 2013. A public announcement will be made shortly afterwards.
