<u>Mowing</u>

Mow at least once a week now. Make sure mower has been serviced and blade replaced or sharpened.

Fertiliser

This is the time to feed and weed (preferably in that order). The fertiliser is predominately Nitrogen in a slow release form, but it may also need Phosphate and Potassium as well as vital trace elements to promote a vibrant lawn.

Weed Control

Once the weeds and grass are actively growing a selective herbicide to kill broad leaved weeds such as dandelions,

Patio/Driveway Weed Control

Weeds can look unsightly at this time of year in patios and driveways. We can spray a total weed killer to kill them and keep weed free for up to 6 months.

Actions required in April

- Mow lawn At least Once Per Week
- Apply Spring Fertiliser To Produce Vibrant Green Lawn
- Spray Weeds



GIRLGUIDING KYM VALLEY DISTRICT URGES MORE PEOPLE TO VOLUNTEER

Kym Valley District

Girlguiding Kym Valley District is calling on residents in the area of Kimbolton, Spaldwick, Grafham, Gt Staughton and Hail Weston to give some time to allow local girls and young women to enjoy a wide range of exciting activities, as well as acquire new skills and experiences themselves.

In the Kym Valley District there are currently 7 units and many more young girls who want to take part. Girlguiding Kym Valley District needs volunteers to give time to support their local groups. There are a huge number of opportunities to get involved in addition to working directly with groups as a leader. In the Kym Valley we do need more leaders to work with our existing units as well as to be able to expand to open new ones, but we also need people to come forward to help with such roles as treasurer, PRA or simply as an occasional helper.

A great number of pioneering individuals are already taking the leap, in Spaldwick too, investing in renewable energies, and reaping a range of benefits as they do so: with income from *feed-in-tariffs* (hopefully reasonably stable for a while), reducing whole life energy costs and long-term supply risks. And on top of that, they also get that satisfying feeling that one can only achieve through being a little more *self-sufficient*. The only real downside, especially in these times, is the need for a degree of upfront-investment.

But there is another way; another approach to meeting the energy challenge, and one that generates a whole host of benefits - the community approach to energy production.

The Rough Guide to Community Energy (TRG2CE), written by Duncan Clark & Malachi Chadwick, provides an excellent introduction to this important topic, for all householders and community organisers alike. Sponsored by leading advocate of sustainable living, Marks & Spencer, its goal is to Influence at community level and enable thousands of UK households to come together and save money while securing energy supplies, and reducing carbon emissions. A worthy aim.

For those starting out on their journey, or perhaps interested in becoming more aware in this increasingly important area, *The Rough Guide to Community Energy* is a valuable read.

The Rough Guide to Community Energy - Review/ Free Copy A Note from Michael Townsend, King' Cottage

The cost of heating and powering our homes has risen drastically in the last few years. Since moving to Spaldwick in early 2008, domestic heating oil has doubled in price. Only slightly less dramatic, gas and electricity prices have taken since around 2003 to achieve the same notable feat. It is no surprise that fuel poverty is on the increase, now standing at one-in-four households in the UK.

Sadly, this situation is likely to get worse. The International Monetary Fund (IMF) recently considered likely scenarios for oil price increases of 60% in the short-term, and 200-600% within twenty years. The question is *when, rather than if* oil and fossil fuels more widely, become unaffordable.

The problem is that conventional sources of energy are declining in availability and becoming more expensive. Production from known oil and gas reserves will fall by around 40-60% by 2030, according to the International Energy Agency. Furthermore, as WWF highlights, if we continue to depend on fossil fuels it will mean substantially higher and more volatile energy costs, along with increasing energy security issues including supply disruptions, accidents and disputes. Nuclear may be a part of the answer, but the investment is expensive and takes many years to deliver, let alone any concerns for safety, and dealing with the long-term effects of waste. Not much to look forward to, then.

But, there is some good news. Renewable energies are becoming more affordable, more widely available, and more popular, despite some of the *noise* to the contrary. Given the upward cost trend of conventional, fossil fuels and the downward trend in renewable energy costs, it becomes a matter of when, not if, we reach the *tipping point* at which renewable energies, even without subsidy, become more affordable than dwindling conventional sources.

Our local units undertake many and varied activities. Last year we took a group of Guides to camp at our Regional Centre in Norfolk where amongst other things they built some rafts, climbed the centre's brand new climbing wall and visited the Wroxham Broads.

Meanwhile our Brownies had a Christmas themed weekend holiday at Stibbington where they helped to cook a full Christmas dinner with all the trimmings. Throughout the past year the girls have enjoyed pond dipping sessions, taken part in sponsored walks to raise funds for local charities and worked on badges such as Wildlife Explorer, Gardener, Science and Team Leader, and some of the Guides have even earned a badge that's all about Chocolate!

Girlguiding UK has an ongoing campaign to seek out more adult members. The organisation is hugely popular, with more than half a million members and volunteers around the UK

Guiding is fun, and it is great to see the girls develop as a Brownie from a shy 7 yr old to become confident 10 yr old willing to try new and varied experiences. As they go onto to become a Guides you see them develop further into confident, self reliant young women and sometimes you even get to see them go on to become young leaders and new guiders; guiding of the future!!

On top of all this comes great fellowship and support from other guiders in the district, who are there to back you up when you need them. As was said by one appreciative parent after our last Brownie holiday "The great thing about guiders is that you can rely on them, they just get on with it, whatever happens."
